





#### Principal's Foreword 2018


2018 was a very successful year at Barambah EEC, with 49 camps, 12 High Ropes days, 20 pre-visits, 6 Duke of Ed camps, 2 weekend visits, 5 day visits and 2 organised Professional Development events. This equated to almost 30,124 instructional hours for 4201 students. 82% of our students attended residential programs, with the remaining 18% participating in day visit programs. Approximately 60% of visiting students were from North Coast Region with 30% of students from Darling Downs South West region. We worked with students from all levels and sectors of schooling.

The highlights for 2018:-





- Facilitation of a Certificate II in Conservation and Land Management for Year 12 students from Murgon SHS.
- Supporting pre-service teachers from the University of the Sunshine Coast through wider field experiences, and students from Queensland University of Technology for their service learning experience.
- Sharing our work for the year with our local community and stakeholders at our annual Community Gathering.
- Continuing targeted data collection processes for analysis and quality assurance of program design and effectiveness of teaching.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Culture Cross-curricula priority – connection to and responsibility for Country/Place.


## **Service Delivery Actuals for 2018**

- to gather data and access information in the field






## **Supportive Learning Environment**


